Poetry! Students have started to learn about different types of poems. First, we began with Cinquain poems. These poems helped students to have a better understanding of nouns, adjectives, verbs, and synonyms. I am so impressed with the creativity and passion happening with poetry in our classroom. Currently, we are looking at the form of a Haiku poem. While writing a Haiku poem, students will focus on syllable count in each line of their poem. We will continue looking at different types of poems and their forms throughout the month of June.

We will continue with reading the book Wonder. Students are practicing reading strategies in their readers notebooks as I read aloud. They have made clear connections, practiced visualizing, and are currently working on giving their opinion using information from the text. Students will also continue to practice reading strategies in their guided reading groups.
